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I. Activities

I.A Training Activities

I.A.1 International Course

The program was organized via online with the theme "Youth Empowerment for Making Change" in June to September for 3 phases, each of which was for 10 days. The total number of participants was 9, from Indonesia, Cambodia, Sri Lanka, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Mongolia. Six out of 9 were from NGOs in the said countries, and the rest were from community-based youth group. Each of participants made review on one's own activities, and tried to identify a new direction through various discussions on how NGOs could facilitate youth to become one of major actors in community building. After the course, AHI staff had online meeting with directors of sending organizations respectively. AHI staff asked them for their active support, so that participants could apply their learnings from AHI training into their own activities, or within their organizations.

I.A.2 Post-Course Follow-up

1) Information sharing through English Newsletter and Website

English newsletters were published in August and in December 2021, aiming at sharing experiences among former participants and AHI. The website was renewed in January 2022, in order to promote their information/experience sharing for learning among them. AHI also offered former participants opportunities of being resource persons in international occasions such as international conferences. Two of Thai former participants joined ASEAN People's forum held In November 2021, to share their grassroots responses against COVID-19

I.A.3 Collaboration for Community Health Promotion

1) Philippines: Healthy Lifestyle Promotion Project

AHI and ANAK-NC (AHI alumni group) supported health promotion in New Corella, Mindanao Island. Activities were not as active as before due to the unstable situation of ANAK-NC especially under the pandemic of COVID-19. The partnership was terminated at the end of the fiscal year 2021.

2) Pakistan: Development of Youth Leaders at small NGOs

AHI collaborated with AIDS Awareness Society (AAS) to develop youth leadership among young staff members of local small NGOs. In 2021, the impact assessment was conducted by AAS and some of former participants.

I.A.4 International Workshop

- Online case study session on "My Application of Learning from ILDC"

AHI promoted experience sharing among AHI former participants. This program, held on February 9, 2022 focused on how the participants applied their learnings from AHI international training. Four of former participants (3 from 2019 training, and 1 from 2017) presented how they applied their learnings into their activities as well as organizational management. 44 Participants joined from different countries including Japan.

I.A.5 Other online sharing and learning

1) Online free talk program

One of Thai participants, who was concerned about Myanmar situation after the Military's seizing the power in February 2021, organized an online program. After the participant from Myanmar shared the situation, the discussion was held about possible roles and activities of CSOs in the militarized societies.

2) Seminar on Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation Method "Most Significant Change(MSC) Technique"

It is very essential in every project, to identify outcomes as well as impact, which is significant for the people. They could contribute to have interventions more efficient and useful. Having a resource person from outside, AHI organized the online seminar on MSC technique, where four organizations participated from Philippines, Sri Lanka and Pakistan. Those organizations made their evaluation activity plans, utilizing MSC technique, and would actually conduct them in the year 2022.

I.B Domestic Activities

I.B.1 Activities to Promote Understanding of Asia and AHI

1) Orientation for Newcomers to AHI

Once in every month AHI offers an orientation for newcomers to AHI and its activities, and encourages them to get involved in AHI activities.

Number of participants (for one year): 49

2) AHI Lectures and Workshops

① Documentary Film Preview Screening "A Song before the Dawn" The film about the inhumane situation of people with mental disorder up to 1970's was presented, being followed by discussions on the exploitative social structure hampering people's well-beings.

② Online program "Hello from Bangladesh"

- With the cooperation of two AHI supporters living in Dhaka, Bangladesh, AHI organized the online program. It was an opportunity for the participants including primary school students to understand the differences of people's life and culture.
- ③ Online program from Thailand "A temple nearby is our community isolation center" Thai former participants shared their community-based responses in the slum area of Bangkok against COVID-19. The community leader shared the experiences, and former participants reported their supports from the outside through the network of multi-stake holders.

I.B.2 Information Sharing and Providing Opportunities to Learn

1) Ajia no Kenko (Health of Asia) - Newsletter for AHI Supporting Members

Covering current situations and activities of NGOs/POs for community development, the newsletter aims to bring Asian grassroots issues closer to AHI supporters and other Japanese people. The editorial committee is comprised of AHI supporting members. This year, five volumes (3,000 copies each) were published.

2) Ajia no Kodomo (Children of Asia) - Newsletter for Japanese Children

With the target readership of upper grades in elementary school, this newsletter aims to let Japanese children know about everyday lives of the same generation living in other parts of Asia. This year, one issue (4,000copies) were published, focusing on inclusive education in Sri Lanka.

3) Website Management

To reach a broad and open range of readers, AHI has developed its website, as well as other SNS media

4) Internships and Volunteer Receiving

AHI accepted internships and volunteer staffs throughout the year. In addition, AHI provided an opportunity for high school students to experience the work at NGO.

I.B.3 Cooperation with Other Organizations

1) Sending Speakers to Other Organizations

In responding to requests, AHI provided speakers to schools and other organizations, for a total of 20 times in 2021. Development education sessions at elementary schools

were conducted at 8 schools.

2) Network Membership

AHI participates in relevant network organizations and policy advocacy. Membership includes: Nagoya NGO Center, Nagoya Council of Churches, and others. Through Nagoya NGO center, AHI is involved in policy recommendations. The "Equal Health and Medical Access on COVID-19 for All" Japan Network, being organized with other 6 organizations, conducted online seminars and submitting request letters to the Japanese government.

3) Translation of "Helping Health Workers Learn"

With the collaboration of Bridges in Public Health, AHI worked for translation of "Helping Health Workers Learn". The Japanese translation is to be published in 2022.

I.C Organizational Management

I.C.1 Board Meetings

AHI held 4 meetings of Board of Directors, and 2 of Board of Trustees. Members as of 31 March 2022 are as follows: 9 directors, 3 auditors, and 10 trustees.

◆"Gift Relay" - Donation through Sales of Used Books/Post Cards/Stamps

With the collaboration of a second-hand bookstore, AHI asks for used book donation. AHI also accepts post cards and stamps as donation.

◆Collaboration with Charity Brand

With the collaboration with a charity brand shop, an original goods(T-shirts, Bags, etc.) were produced for charity sales.

♦Guidance for Writing a Living Will

A large proportion of AHI supporters are now elderly and thinking seriously about how to communicate their feelings through their wills. A former AHI staff gave the guidance session on writing a will and conducted two private consultations in May and November 2021. In total 19 individuals/couples participated.
